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Aims and Scope

Türkderm-Turkish Archives of Dermatology and Venereology (Formerly Türkderm-Archives of the Turkish Dermatology and Venereology) is the official journal of the Society of Dermatology and Venereology. This editorially independent, unbiased, international journal periodically publishes peer-reviewed work in all areas of dermatology and venereology. Publication languages are Turkish and English. The journal is published in English since December issue of 2016 as an e-journal.

The journal is published quarterly in March, June, September and December with 1 or 2 supplement issues in June and December.

The target audience of Türkderm-Turkish Archives of Dermatology and Venereology is specialists and resident physicians in dermatology and venereology.

Articles in Turkish or English are both accepted for publication in print with the understanding that an English version is provided for the online publication prior to the final acceptance of the article. A Turkish version is not requested for articles submitted in English.

The editorial policies are based on the "Recommendations for the Conduct, Reporting, Editing, and Publication of Scholarly Work in Medical Journals (ICMJE Recommendations)" by the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (2016, archived at <http://www.icmje.org/>) rules.

Türkderm-Turkish Archives of Dermatology and Venereology is indexed in **Web of Science-Emerging Sources Citation Index (ESCI), Hinari, GOALI, ARDI, OARE, Excerpta Medica/EMBASE, EBSCO Database, CINAHL, Index Copernicus, DOAJ, Scopus, ProQuest, British Library, J-Gate, IdealOnline, ROOT INDEXING, Turkish Medline-National Citation Index, Turkiye Citation Index and TUBITAK/ULAKBIM, CABI.**

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10.3. Author information should enter the system only while registering the summary. The electronic files to be uploaded to the system (full text, references, etc.) should in no way include the name and surname of the author.

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Includes clinical research, clinical observation, new methods, and experimental and laboratory studies. Research articles should include title, abstract, keywords related with main topic of the study, findings, discussion, acknowledgements, references, tables, graphs, and pictures. Title, abstract, and keywords should be both in Turkish and English.

11.2. **Abstract:** A summary of the manuscript should be written in both Turkish and English and not exceed 300 words. References should not be cited in the abstract. Use of abbreviations should be avoided as much as possible; if any abbreviations are used, they must be taken into consideration independently of the abbreviations used in the text.

The abstracts in English should include the following paragraphs: Background and design, material(s) and method(s), result(s), conclusion.

11.3. For original articles, the structured abstract should include the following sub-headings:

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Materials and Methods: The study and standard criteria used should be defined; it should also be indicated whether the study is randomized or not, whether it is retrospective or prospective, and the statistical methods applied should be indicated, if applicable.

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Keywords: A list of minimum 3, but no more than 5 keywords must follow the abstract. Key words in English should be consistent with "Medical Subject Headings (MESH)" (www.nlm.nih.gov/mesh/MBrowser.html). Turkish keywords should be direct translations of the terms in MESH.

11.4. Original research articles should have the following sections:

Introduction: Should consist of a brief explanation of the topic and indicate the objective of the study, supported by information from the literature.

Materials and Methods: The study plan should be clearly described, indicating whether the study is randomized or not, whether it is retrospective or prospective, the number of trials, the characteristics, and the statistical methods used.

Results: The results of the study should be stated, with tables/figures given in numerical order; the results should be evaluated according to the statistical analysis methods applied. See General Guidelines for details about the preparation of visual material.

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Study Limitations: Limitations of the study should be discussed. In addition, an evaluation of the implications of the obtained findings/results for future research should be outlined.

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References: Authors are responsible for the accuracy of the references. See General Guidelines for details about the usage and formatting required.

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Case reports should present cases which are rarely seen, feature novelty in diagnosis and treatment, and contribute to our current knowledge. The first page should include the title in Turkish and English, an unstructured summary not exceeding 150 words, and key words. The main text should consist of introduction, case report, discussion and references. The entire text should not exceed 5 pages (A4, formatted as specified above).

11.6. Letter to the Editor

These letters address issues or exchange views on topics arising from published articles. They should be concise, not exceed 750 words, should not include an abstract, and references should be limited to 5. Short case reports may also be published under this heading.

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Reviews: Articles are written to summarize the current state of understanding on a topic in the field of dermatology and venereology with an unbiased and comprehensive perspective. Reviews to be considered for publication should be written by authors having previously published manuscripts in the peer reviewed journals and proving their qualified expertise in the area. Authors considering the submission of a review article should contact the editors in advance to determine if the topic is of interest to the journal.
